PTNA Chair – Professor Andrew Davidson

Andrew Davidson is Senior Staff Anaesthetist and Director of Clinical Research for the Royal Children's Hospital. He is also Head of Anaesthesia Research at the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, Head of the Melbourne Children's Trial Centre and Associate Professor in Department of Paediatrics, University of Melbourne.

Andrew trained in anaesthesia in Melbourne, Nottingham, Rotterdam and Boston. He has received a Diploma of Biostatistics and Epidemiology and Doctorate of Medicine (MD) from University of Melbourne.

Currently editor in chief (elect) for the journal Paediatric Anaesthesia, Associate Editor for Anaesthesiology, Andrew has published over 90 peer reviewed publications, one book and 15 book chapters. He has been awarded four NHMRC grants along with major research grants in Canada and the UK, and is currently the ANZCA Lennard Travers Professor.

The group of around a dozen research coordinators where shown WebSpirit's project and site management capabilities, data entry and checking (monitoring) functionality, and were introduced to the eCRF design and visit scheduling process. The demo was followed by questions and a discussion of WebSpirit's strong points relative to alternative systems, and several participants commented that it was a very interesting session.

Our Project Officer, Jennifer Thompson and Database Manager, Michael Emamooden have visited several member and non-member sites over the past two months to introduce them to the PTNA and WebSpirit. COMBAT CF: A Phase 3, multi-centre, randomised, placebo-controlled study of azithromycin in the primary prevention of radiologicallydefined bronchiectasis in infants with cystic fibrosis Lead Site: Queensland Children's Medical Research Institute.

DMD: Clinical trial of Zoledronic acid (Aclasta) in children and adolescents with Duchenne muscular dystrophy. Lead site: Murdoch Children's' Medical Research Institute.

Rap-CV: Phase I study of Vinorelbine, Cyclophosphamide and Rapamycin for Recurrent Malignancies in Children. Lead site: The Children's Hospital at Westmead

ZAP: Bisphosphonate Treatment in Childhood Femoral Head Avascular Necrosis due to Perthes Disease. Lead site: The Children's Hospital at Westmead.

This month we welcome:

PAEDS : Surveillance for 6 different infectious diseases, vaccine preventable diseases or conditions associated with adverse events following immunisation. Lead site: The Children's Hospital at Westmead. At the time of newsletter release, the final stages of CRF testing are underway and live data entry will commence shortly.

WEBSPIRIT FAQ:

Q: How are project eCRFs set up in WebSpirit and is this easy to do?

A: It is not difficult to create data entry screens that reflect your paper CRFs. You will be given training to allow you to create your own data entry screens by adding the required fields and setting their properties (e.g. date, character, numeric, mandatory or optional). Alternatively you can take and modify pre-existing screens from the WebSpirit library. Logic checks can then be applied to the data entry fields to limit entry errors. The PTNA Database Manager always supports you through this process.
